What do we learn in Pre-K?

Young children learn in holistic ways.
They do not separate their learning into categories or subjects. Everything they learn and experience builds on previous knowledge. Children learn in multiple ways to construct understanding of the world around them. This learning occurs through the four developmental domains:



Children develop as whole persons whose modes of learning are interrelated.

Learning and development in one domain can influence learning and development in other domains. This is holistic development.

Family Involvement

Each of the prekindergarten programs provide a wide range of opportunities for the families to be involved with their children's very first educational experience. Although there is an open door policy and families are invited to be involved any time, a minimum of one day is set aside each month that encourages families to participate in the program and play and learn along side their children. This allows parents to be involved in an activity to do with their child, experience the learning their child is enduring through observation, or just enjoy the opportunity to meet and associate with other families and the classroom teacher.
